IN PARLIAMENT THIS MONTH

March has been a busy month in Parliament as we approach the Easter recess. I spoke in the Chamber on Welfare Reform, highlighting critical gaps in mental health services and stressing the need for greater public health investment.

I also raised a question to Defence Ministers on the growing threat of antimicrobial resistance in conflict zones, highlighting how rising infections complicate battlefield wound treatment, prolonging recovery times and adding challenges for medical teams.

Outside the Chamber, I co-chaired the UK-Africa Health Summit alongside the Nigerian Health Minister after joining a delegation to Nigeria earlier this month with the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Global Health & Security.

NUTRITION FOR GROWTH



Nutrition For Growth Summit, Paris, 2025

As a Health and Social Care Committee member, I continued my public health work and was the keynote speaker at a Gambling - Chapter One event, raising concerns about the widespread harms of problem gambling.

I have sent written questions, including one on removing asbestos from public buildings. Asbestos is the leading cause of work-related deaths in Great Britain. Around 5,000 people die yearly from asbestos-related diseases, and sadly, death rates are rising among school and hospital staff. We received a reply that the Department of Work and Pensions is committed to getting much better data on where there is asbestos and moving towards plans for removal.

I recently returned from a flying one-day visit to Paris to take part in the Nutrition For Growth Summit 2025.

I met with a range of stakeholders, including representatives from the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) to discuss the importance of integrating nutrition into health policies.

I remain deeply committed to strengthening the UK's role in addressing malnutrition, supporting sustainable food systems and promoting international cooperation on health and nutrition.

KICKING THE HABIT

This month I spoke in the Chamber at the remaining stages of the Tobacco and Vapes Bill. Smoking remains the biggest driver of health inequality in England, disproportionally affecting marginalised communities and those on lower incomes.

Smoking causes over 16 different types of cancer and around 160 people are diagnosed with cancer caused by smoking every day. The harsh fact is that the more disadvantaged you are, the more likely you are to suffer from smoking related disease and premature death. Having run smoking cessation services as a public health consultant I know just how incredibly hard it can be to quit and I congratulate everyone who has managed to kick the habit for good.

I am extremely proud to be part of a government working to create the first smoke-free generation but we must also continue to monitor and address all the underlying health inequalities across our society as part of our 10-year Plan for the NHS.

One thing I see on every school visit, whether it be to specialist schools like Hawthorns and Oak Grove College or more mainstream schools like Angmering and Durrington High, is the need for better investment in SEND provision. And by better I mean not just increased but smarter, more targeted funding. With rising demand for SEND services, it can be incredibly difficult for parents to find suitable school places near to home. Often, the needs of their children could be met in a local mainstream school if it were allocated just a fraction of the cost of transporting those students to specialist settings miles away.

Although we don't have full details of Sussex devolution yet, I firmly believe it will help, as a wider picture emerges and funding can be more strategically targeted.

I've suggested that school leaders could work with other local heads and teaching staff in putting together a plan of what they think

education management should look like under the new unitary system – and I'll be fully supporting them in putting SEND front and centre.
